#### Overview ::

Your portfolio is uniquely yours. It's neither better than nor worse than the next students. It's not a scrapbook of everything you have ever done in school, but rather a visual invitation to show where you want to go; a guide to creating your most excellent career-life possibilities. It introduces your very self as well as your ideas, creative process and production skills to an expanding network of family, friends, potential collaborators and employers, freelance opportunities, and the design community.

Your portfolio is your ticket to infinity and beyond. But, before you can begin to create your portfolio, you have to know where it is that you want it to take you (besides out of here).

Take two minutes to sit in the whole brain posture. Do a brief zebra dance first if necessary. Then thoughtfully complete these pages. Be very specific. Add as many other details as you like. You may alter them at a later time. Goals can change with new directions added.

Remember that who you are and what you can contribute is more important than what you have already done. Employers are not hiring you for what you have done, but for the work that you will do for them.

You will be required to revise existing projects and produce new work for your portfolio. Originality of content will be required, except in some individual project circumstances. In every project, proper credits and permissions will be required on the final portfolio pages.
